I. Background to the Presbytery Mission Plan

General Assembly

At the 2021 General Assembly, the Faith Nurture Forum asked the Assembly to instruct Presbyteries to begin working on new Presbytery Mission Plans with a reduced number of ministries and to report no later than 31st December 2022. The Presbytery of Perth was subsequently informed that its number of centrally funded ministries (Ministers of Word and Sacrament and Ministries Development Staff (MDS)) would be reduced **from 26 FTE to 16.5 FTE**.

The reasons behind making this decision are now well understood and centre on the dramatic decline of the Church of Scotland since the mid-1950s. The membership reached a peak in 1956 when its membership was 1,319,574 across 2000 congregations and served by 1600 ministers.¹ In the *Volume of Reports for the 2021 General Assembly of the Church of Scotland* the current membership is stated as 312,204. Within the Presbytery of Perth, the membership stands at 10,905.

With such disheartening statistics there is real concern that local churches could either become despondent or complacent. Both responses are unhelpful. Instead of looking back and dwelling on the past, the church must look to the future and accept that **mission** should be central to the life of the Church.

What is meant by Mission?

There is often misunderstanding when it comes to the term 'mission'. Some would say that mission is about evangelism: the spreading of the Christian gospel by public preaching or personal witness. Others might regard ministries of service to the community as being missional. Perhaps the best definition of mission is that it encompasses both of these.

Mission, however, should never be understood as a means of getting new people to come along to Sunday worship for the purpose of sustaining the local congregation. Instead, at the heart of mission is how the Kingdom of God might be grown by the local congregation and how the Gospel of Jesus Christ can transform lives. The health of a congregation might therefore be measured not so much by how many people attend on a Sunday but how the local congregation engages with the local community and how it through word and action communicates the love of God.

Now while it is important to recognise the changing context and culture in which the Church operates, it is also vital that we do not lose hope and Biblical perspective. We must remember that the mission of the church is fundamentally God's mission. Not ours! In one interview recorded by David McCarthy in his book, *Seeing Afresh*, the local church is reminded that:

It's not our mission, but God's; God is already out there in the community and in the midst of society. Our job, our challenge, is to get alongside God and join in what he is already doing: be in the midst of life and show God's love. That's what Jesus did: he went out among people and he loved them.²

How can we do this?

Five Marks of Mission

Faith Nurture Forum wishes to be clear about the **priority of mission**, and in particular the *Five Marks of Mission*” as we move into the future.

These Five Marks of God’s Mission are:

1. To proclaim the Good News of the Kingdom
2. To teach, baptise and nurture new believers
3. To respond to human need by loving service
4. To seek to transform unjust structures of society, to challenge violence of every kind and pursue peace and reconciliation
5. To strive to safeguard the integrity of creation and sustain and renew the life of the earth.³

Sometimes they are re-written as “Tell - Teach - Tend - Transform – Treasure”

In 2017, Doug Gay spoke warmly of the *Five Mark of Mission*:

This is the kind of full-spectrum lens which I believe we need to refocus the life and work of the Church of Scotland. It calls evangelicals beyond individualism to social and ecological ethics. It reminds liberals of the importance of evangelism and discipleship... This is the key insight which I think can be the star which guides us on the next stage of the Kirk’s journey... Missiology frames ecclesiology which frames ministry.⁴

It is also the view of the Church of Scotland Theological Forum that these Five Marks of Mission help the Church to understand God’s Mission as we move ahead.

They include essential aspects of the missional work of the church: evangelism, discipleship, pastoral care, social justice, reconciliation and care for creation. This combination echoes the teaching of Jesus, the practice of the early church, the message of the biblical prophets, insights from the experiences of poor and oppressed people, and openness to science and ecological awareness. Their language and emphases are agreeable to our Reformed understanding.⁵

This Presbytery Mission Plan encourages and urges all congregations to be missionally active using the Five Marks of Mission and to continue reaching out into their communities in appropriate and meaningful ways. The Plan recognises the value of the local church and of its Christian presence in local places where the people are known and understood. Churches can be instrumental in bringing communities together and helping them thrive as we have seen throughout the COVID pandemic.

Churches exist to help us worship God and to show his love to everyone in our parishes. However, we now find ourselves in a place where the local church requires to adapt to a changing context and requires becoming fitter and leaner as we move forward.

Given the constraints across the whole Church, it is not possible to provide all the ministry requirements that the local church may want, but the Plan makes every effort to keep as many congregations together and tries to provide a way forward that will not dishearten local people but instead provide hope and therefore encouragement to find new ways of working.

New Ways of Working

The mission of the Church will be best served by embracing the idea that ministry belongs to the whole people of God and not just to ordained Ministers of Word and Sacrament. The allocated number of ministry posts in the Presbytery of Perth is dropping from 26 to 16.5FTE. It goes without saying that fewer ministers can hardly do what was possible by a larger number in former days.

Ministers, elders and members will need to work together in new and creative ways. The plan does not include any non-stipendiary ministries such as Ordained Local Ministers (OLMs), Readers and Worship Leaders. There is no doubt that their ministries enrich the Church. OLMs and Attached Readers will be allocated to churches and networks at the time when such ministries become available, and when the gifts and talents of those offering their services can be matched appropriately to a suitable charge.

New ways of working must also extend across traditional parish boundaries. Congregations now require developing stronger partnerships where they become symbiotic with one another. Meeting together to consider the needs of others often results in our own needs being met. For that reason, Parish Groupings within each network are proposed and parish boundaries are to be redrawn as appropriate.

The mission of the Church should also be understood as an ecumenical endeavour. Where there are opportunities, congregations are to explore partnerships and shared approaches with other churches and denominations. It should be noted that the Church of Scotland has recently entered into agreements with the Scottish Episcopal Church and the Roman Catholic Church. Congregations and networks should make full use of the Church of Scotland's Ecumenical Officer when exploring this further.

The Church is given the privilege in sharing in this work of God in our communities. Christ commissioned his disciples: *to make disciples of all nations*.⁶ Liam Jerrold Fraser in his book. *Mission in Contemporary Scotland reminds us that* on the day of Pentecost, Christ did a new thing:

He formed the Church, the community of the new creation, through the gift of the Holy Spirit. Through their preaching, service and empowered by the Holy Spirit, they became witnesses to Christ and the Father. The Church is not a creation of men and women, but the creation of the Lord himself. Its ministry is Christ's ministry, its mission is his mission. When its leaders preach, Christ preaches. When its members forgive, Christ forgives. When it baptises and celebrates the Lord's Supper, Christ baptises and celebrates. Through the ministry and mission of the Church, the Kingdom or reign of God is manifested, and where the Kingdom is, there the new creation begins to take root.⁷

The Church must not become despondent nor complacent. Instead, the church needs to hear afresh once more the call of Jesus when he said, *Follow me, and I will make you fish for people*.⁸

This is the context in which the Presbytery of Perth Planning and Development Committee has conducted its work and has formulated the *Presbytery Mission Plan: November 2022*.

2. The Presbytery Mission Plan

The Procedure

The Planning and Development Committee (P&D) of the Presbytery of Perth has had overall oversight of the Presbytery Mission Planning process. P&D was assisted by the Presbytery Fabric Committee, which kindly agreed to take on responsibility for the Asset Management Building Audits (AMBA) for which P&D is most grateful. The results of AMBA have been fed into this process.

The process which has led to this Presbytery Mission Plan has been a long one, taking several years albeit accelerated in the last year. Some years ago, every congregation became part of a network within the Presbytery and were encouraged to talk with one another to determine the ways they could work more closely together. At the same time, P&D formulated 'Planning Principles' which helped significantly at a later stage in the planning process.

To help P&D in its work, congregations were asked during Summer 2021 to provide supporting evidence through the completion of a 'planning toolkit' that would inform the committee's decision making.

From September 2021 to December 2021, P&D studied each toolkit response in detail and noted the evidence that each congregation provided that demonstrated growth in a particular area such as in discipleship, finance, numbers who were active, outreach and mission to the community and also to creation itself.

In January 2022, the Interim Presbytery Mission Plan for congregations was formulated. This Interim Plan was presented at a special meeting of Presbytery and was also livestreamed. The report set out how 16.5FTE ministries should be allocated across the presbytery. The Presbytery Mission Plan prioritized the resourcing of congregations where there was evidence of growth, sustainability and innovation as well as areas of growing population.

From March 2022 to September 2022, P&D visited every Kirk Session, and the opportunity was given to ministers and elders to express their thoughts regarding the Interim Report. Regular meetings of P&D continued where feedback from those visits was shared with other members and where further changes to the Plan were discussed.

During summer 2022, the Fabric Committee undertook AMBA. The results of the audits were released at the end of October 2022 in time for a final report to be presented to Presbytery in November 2022.

In our process we have sought to be as open and collaborative as possible whilst at the same recognising the need for P&D to take responsibility and show vision and leadership throughout this complicated and highly charged process.

The Plan is not perfect. It will require every congregation to work more collaboratively with others than previously. It is recognised that ministry resources are restricted and, in some networks, spread thinly. Congregations must therefore have realistic and manageable expectations of the ministries within their network, and it is hoped that every congregation will prayerfully try and make this work. This Plan can be achieved by planning purposefully, preparing prayerfully, proceeding positively and pursuing persistently.

As this plan is implemented and churches and presbyteries work together in new ways, may the fruit of the Holy Spirit be evident in all the interactions. And, at such a time, it is also important to recall and fully consider what the Apostle Paul wrote in his Letter to the Ephesians:

I want you to get out there and walk—better yet, run!—on the road God called you to travel. I don't want any of you sitting around on your hands. I don't want anyone strolling off, down some path that goes nowhere. And mark that you do this with humility and discipline—not in fits and starts, but steadily, pouring yourselves out for each other in acts of love, alert at noticing differences and quick at mending fences.⁹

3. Update from November 2022

The Plan received overwhelming support by the Presbytery in November 2022 but PMPIG requested that Presbytery revisit some of its decisions. They recommended in such areas, where the Mission Plan currently differs from its recommendations, that buildings should be categorised as 'B' until a robust review takes place at the end of Year One of the Plan using criteria that has been developed by Presbytery in partnership with the congregation in full consultation with GTs and PMPIG). In additions to buildings criteria, it will also refer to the Five Marks of Mission. It will need to be a comprehensive review where every aspect of congregational life is explored (and congregations are encouraged to engage with others as appropriate. This process will lead to a clearer understanding of what buildings are required for the mission of the church in that locality and those buildings which should be recategorized 'A'.

It is recognized that this has caused a great deal of anxiety and uncertainty and concern has also been raised over the accuracy of some of the AMBA scores.

By proceeding in this way, the Plan is more likely to be approved with opportunities to keep dialogue open over the next year.

4. During Year One of Plan

PMPIG has also requested that once The Plan has been approved, all congregations are asked to **meet together in their new networks** and to submit to the Presbytery Planning and Deployment Committee, **two or three** mission goals per congregation (relating to the Five Marks of Mission), which will become their focus in the coming year. In order to do this within the timescale, congregations are invited to revisit their responses to the 'Strategic Toolkit', which was produced at the start of the Presbytery Mission Planning process, and also to use Five Year Plans from recent Local Church Reviews.

These mission goals should be submitted by the **end of October 2023**. It is hoped that this will be helpful to congregations in the first year of the new plan.
